#### Executive Director, Global Taiwan Institute

Russell Hsiao is the executive director of the Global Taiwan Institute and editor-in-chief of the *Global Taiwan Brief*. He previously served as a senior research fellow at the Project 2049 Institute and national security fellow at the Foundation for Defense of Democracies in Washington DC. Prior to those positions he was the editor of *China Brief* at the Jamestown Foundation from October 2007 to July 2011 and a special assistant in the International Cooperation Department at the Taiwan Foundation for Democracy.
