Dr. Allison Abbe Research Psychologist, Professor of Organizational Studies and the Matthew B. Ridgway Chair of Leadership **Studies** 

U.S. Army War College



Allison Abbe is Professor of Organizational Studies and the Matthew B. Ridgway Chair of Leadership Studies at the U.S. Army War College. She serves as course director for the strategic Leadership course and also teaches defense management, inclusive leadership, and leading in multinational organizations. Dr. Abbe's research interests apply behavioral science insights to strategic human capital management and leader development. In both her research and practitioner experiences, she has advanced how organizations assess and develop leadership, intercultural, and interpersonal skills in national security personnel.

She previously served as a program manager and research psychologist in defense and intelligence organizations, including the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, the U.S. Army Research Institute for the Behavioral and Social Sciences, and the interagency High-Value Detainee Interrogation Group. At the High-Value Detainee Interrogation Group, she translated research findings into evidence-based training and education for intelligence interviewing and interrogation. She has also been a research staff member with the Institute for Defense Analyses, conducting personnel and manpower studies for the Office of the Secretary of Defense, Air Force, and Army. Her research included the development of new methods for tracking joint experiences in Air Force officers.

Prior to re-entering government service, Dr. Abbe was a Visiting Assistant Professor at George Washington University. She has also taught at Marymount University, George Mason University, and the University of California, Riverside. She holds a PhD in Social and Personality Psychology from the University of California, Riverside, and bachelors degrees in Psychology and Political Science from the University of Southern Mississippi. While completing her high school and undergraduate studies, she was a GS-1 with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Dr. Abbe is a recipient of the Army's 2009 Research and Development Achievement Award for her work on cross-cultural competence and the Army War College's Excellence in Public Scholarship Award for her publications on gender and racial inclusion. Her work has appeared in Joint Force Quarterly, Government Executive, War Room, Parameters, Military Review, the Journal of Investigative Psychology and Offender Profiling, and Police Practice and Research.

Dr. Stephen J. AguiIar, Assistant Professor USC Rossier School of Education



Dr. Stephen J. Aguilar is an Assistant Professor of Education in the Educational Psychology concentration at the USC Rossier School of Education. His research focuses on investigating how educational technologies—both emerging and established—influence teaching, learning, and motivation. To this end, Dr. Aguilar explores the impact of learning analytics, generative AI in educational settings, the digital equity gap, and gameful approaches to teaching and learning. Currently, he is co-leading USC's new Center for Generative AI and Society's efforts to understand when and how generative AI is used by students and instructors in post-secondary settings. His honors and awards include winning both the Wilbert J. McKeachie Early Career Award for Motivation in Education Research, and the AERA Division C Early Career Award. His work has been funded by the National Science Foundation, the American Educational Research Association (AERA), and the National Institutes of Health, among others. Dr. Aguilar' has also given televised interviews on the digital equity gap in both English and Spanish, has been guest on NPR's AirTalk, and has been interviewed by the Los Angeles Times, USA Today, and The Washington Post.

Mandy J. Allen Branch Chief Officer Leader Development Branch at the United States Army Ordnance School



In May 2023, Mandy assumed the role of Branch Chief for the Officer Leader Development Branch at the Army Ordnance School. In her capacity as a Senior Training Specialist, she shoulders the responsibility of supervising the Officer Leader Development Branch training team. Her role encompasses the development of unit, institutional, and extension training materials for noncommissioned officers (common core), warrant officers, and officer training programs.

Mandy's contributions extend to various facets of training, including Computer-Based Instruction, Soldier Training Products, Programs of Instruction, Mission Training Plans, multimedia training, and more. She adeptly assesses the need for organizational training based on turnover rates and estimates the influx of new staff, ensuring a strategic and adaptive approach to training initiatives.

Prof. Jose-Luis Ambite, Research Associate Professor University of Southern California



Dr. Ambite is a Research Associate Professor of Computer Science, and a Principal Scientist at the Information Sciences Institute, both at the University of Southern California. He is an expert in data integration, including query rewriting under constraints, learning schema mappings, entity linkage, and information extraction. He received the Best Research Paper award at the International Semantic Web Conference in 2012. In the "L2K2R2: Learn to Read to Know, Know to Learn to Read" project, funded under the DARPA Big Mechanism program, he developed neural entity extraction and normalization methods from biomedical literature. For the NIH Big Data to Knowledge (BD2K) Training Coordination Center, he developed information retrieval, natural language processing, and machine learning methods to automatically discover, model, and organize learning resources on the open web, which resulted in the creation of the educational resource discovery index, a compendium of ~12,000 data science training resources. His research interests include data integration, databases, knowledge representation, semantic web, semantic similarity, biomedical data science, and federated learning.



Mr. Alan Kang Dept of Information Science University of Arizona







Dr. Jeffrey C. Sun Associate Dean for Innovation and Strategic Partnerships University of Louisville





MAJ Randy E. Swepston Army University, School of Advanced Military Studies




