Dr. Akimoto joined the organization in January 2019 and brings with him experience in the areas of business, research, dialogue, and exchanges between Japan and the United States.

Prior to joining Sasakawa USA, Dr. Akimoto was senior vice president of Mitsubishi Corporation, and his career has included roles at Mitsubishi International Corporation, Hughes Electronics, DirecTV Japan, Massachusetts Corporation for Educational Telecommunications, Keidanren USA, Japan Society and Mt. Fuji Dialogue. On top of his responsibilities at Sasakawa USA, Dr. Akimoto is a contributing writer for *The Japan Times*, associate fellow at the International Institute for Strategic Studies in the UK, a contributing commentator for the Okazaki Institute in Japan, and a Japan Advisory Committee member of the Salzburg Global Seminar in Austria. Dr. Akimoto received a PhD in sociology and a MA in East Asian studies from Harvard University, as well as a BA in law from Keio University. He also received a certificate in Russian studies from Leningrad State University (currently St. Petersburg State University).

- Colonel Shane D. Celeen is currently the Director of the Department of Joint, Interagency, and Multinational Operations (DJIMO) at the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff's Chair for Joint Professional Military Education (JPME) at the Combined Arms Center at Fort Leavenworth, KS. COL Celeen commissioned as an Armor Officer from the United States Military Academy in 1996. He has served in a variety of leadership and staff positions at Friedberg Germany, Fort Riley KS (twice), Seattle WA, Fort Collins CO, Fort Irwin CA, Fort Leavenworth KS (twice), and U.S. Consulate General in Erbil, Iraq. He has four combat deployments to Iraq and one operational deployment to Bosnia-Herzegovina. Colonel Celeen's commands include 2nd Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, and C Company, 2nd Battalion, 70th Armored Regiment. His academic experience includes serving as the Vice Provost Academic Affairs for Army University, Professor of Military Science for Colorado State University Army ROTC, U.S. Army's Battalion Pre-Command Course Instructor, and Assistant Professor of Military Science at University of Washington's Army ROTC program as well as the current DJIMO Director at CGSC. Colonel Celeen recently served as the Senior Military Advisor at the U.S. Consulate General in Erbil, Iraq 2019-2020, in support of the U.S. State Department. His military education includes the U.S. Army War College (Master's Degree in Strategic Studies), Advanced Faculty Development Course, Battalion Pre-Command Course and Tactical Commander Development Course, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff Officer Course, the U.S. Army Combined Arms Services Staff School, Armor Officer Basic and Captains' Career Courses, Air Assault School, and U.S. Air Force Survival, Escape, Resistance, and Evasion Course.  Dr. Mahir J. Ibrahimov (also known as Dr. I.) is the Director of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College (CGSC) Cultural and Area Studies Office (CASO), the U.S Army Combined Arms Center, U.S. Department of Defense.

He is the author or editor of six books, and his expertise has been featured in global media outlets such as BBC World News, Los Angeles Times, other global media venues, as well as U.S. Department of Defense documentaries, interviews and newsreels.

As the first U.S. Army Culture and Foreign Language Advisor, he established a successful Culture and Foreign Language Program during the U.S. and coalition military and related Counterinsurgency (COIN) operations in Iraq, Afghanistan and other regions of the world. It was recognized as the Army-wide model, and he was promoted to become the Army's Senior Culture and Foreign Language Advisor. In that position, and later as Director of CASO, he continues developing and improving the program with an outreach extending across the Army and beyond with a variety of educational programs, including publishing, guest speakers, direct support to CGSC classes, live panels, video podcasts, international cooperation, and research.

Dr. I. served as a deputy platoon commander in the Soviet Army and witnessed the breakup of the Soviet Union. Then he was a Senior Middle East Expert in Moscow, USSR.

After the demise of the USSR, Mahir helped to open the first embassy of independent Azerbaijan and served as a senior diplomat in Washington, DC., then he served as the vice president of the newly established American University in Azerbaijan, which followed by his work at the Foreign Service Institute, U.S. Department of State in Washington DC.

While providing vital assistance to U.S. forces in the Middle East as a multi-lingual cultural adviser, Dr. Ibrahimov was featured as the linguistic 'genius' in early years of Iraq war and during the U.S. and coalition Counterinsurgency (COIN) operations in the region. He has then served as the first senior U.S. Army Culture and Foreign Language Advisor, travelled to Ukraine as part of the U.S. Army Chief of Staff 'Study,' and provided follow on recommendations in support of U.S. national security.

Because of his extensive regional and global expertise, he regularly travels in support of NATO partners and missions.
