

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- The rarity of military drafts in Russian and Soviet history
- Putin's evocation of the "Great Patriotic War"
- Desertion and disarray in World War I
- The end of empires





- Armageddon delayed, not averted
- Decolonization in Russia and Eurasia in a global comparative context
- How Russia can acquire territory but grow weaker and more isolated



The Risks of a Weakened Russia



- A more extreme leadership
- Increased nuclear threat
- Expanded role for China, Iran, Turkey
- Regional instability in the Caucasus and Central Asia
- Mass migration
- How will the US respond?

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Before the 2022 Russian "Special Operation"



- India prefers multipolar order
- Increased alignment with the US and the Quad after 2020 Chinese aggression
 - But worries about US dominance
- Sought Russia/China split to help counter China
- Multi-alignment, rather than nonalignment, for strategic autonomy








- Complicates India's multipolar vision
- Difficult increase alignment with the US
 - While aligned to Russia
 - Can't abandon Russia
 - History/Reciprocity/Arms dependence
- Twin goals of autonomy and security requires indigenizing arms manufacturing
 - Difficult to get US help while (tacitly) supporting Russia in war





Implications for the Indo-Pacific



- Cross-cutting alignments
 - Will limit the effectiveness of the counter-China coalition
- Limits to US-India partnership
 - Historical baggage / mutual-hypocrisy
 - US-Pakistan relations
 - India unlikely to accept role of junior partner
- Can the US invest in India's growth while it stays (semi)aligned to Russia?

Organization and Capabilities



Source documents provide guidance for training in three broad areas.

- Core Cultural Competencies: Core cultural competencies include areas such as understanding culture, applying organizational awareness, cultural
 perspective taking, and cultural adaptability.
- 2) Regional/Technical Competencies: Regional/technical competencies deal with applying regional information and operating in a regional environment.
- 3) Leader/Influence Functions: Leader/influence functions include strategic (cultural) agility, (cultural) systems thinking, cross-cultural influences,
- organizational cultural competence, and utilizing interpreters/advisors.
