



Chinese Economic Impact in Central Asia

- January 2024 China and Uzbekistan announced, "allweather partnership."
- Uzbekistan is a strategic priority for China due to its population and expanding economy in Central Asia.
- China has recently surpassed Russia to become Uzbekistan's largest trade partner, accounting for about 1/5 of Uzbek trade. (21% versus 15%) Now true across Central Asia as a whole.
- Uzbekistan still runs serious trade deficit with China.
- Kazakh-Russian tensions have made China wary.
- Uzbek trade deals with the European Union and United Kingdom offer a way for China to dodge restrictions and move goods .
- Approval of Chinese investments in Uzbekistan is far higher than elsewhere.
- China vastly expanding its electric car business in Uzbekistan.
- Uzbekistan a booster of Trans Afghan Rail and China-Kyrgyzstan-Uzbekistan rail.





Chinese Soft Power • In 20th Century Tashkent was the center of USSR China studies.



- Confucius Institute established in Uzbekistan soon after independence to promote Mandarin Chinese.
- Today competition among Chinese, Russian and English languages is a barometer of Uzbek aspirations.
- Higher education contacts expanding. China setting up trade schools in Uzbekistan.
- Uzbek pupils recently fared poorly on PISA academic skills exam.
- Uzbek media very supportive of Belt & Road Initiative.

Organization and Capabilities



Source documents provide guidance for training in three broad areas.

- Core Cultural Competencies: Core cultural competencies include areas such as understanding culture, applying organizational awareness, cultural perspective taking, and cultural adaptability.
- 2) Regional/Technical Competencies: Regional/technical competencies deal with applying regional information and operating in a regional environment.
- Leader/Influence Functions: Leader/influence functions include strategic (cultural) agility, (cultural) systems thinking, cross-cultural influences, organizational cultural competence, and utilizing interpreters/advisors.
