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

- World's largest archipelagic state (18,110 Islands – 6000 inhabited) – Various Typology
- 14th-largest country by area
 (1,904,569 sq km / 735,358 sq miles)
- 280 Million Population (1300 Ethnic groups & 700 Indigenous Languages)
- Free-Active Policy (Member of UN, G20, ASEAN, APEC, WTO, OIC, IORA)
- Military: 900.000 Active Duties, 8000 Reserves & 20,000 Civilian


